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
More than 1 in 4 Georgia Children Do Not Have Enough Food to Eat

 are food insecure
- Georgia is the sixth worst state for child poverty, at a rate of 27.2%

Child Food Insecurity Has Been Linked to:

- Developmental delays, poorer attachment, and learning difficulties in the first two years of life
- Hospitalization
- Higher risk for chronic health conditions, such as anemia and asthma
- More frequent oral health problems
- Truancy and school tardiness
- Behavior problems, including: fighting, aggression, anxiety, and bullying


