




Who Are the Poor in Georgia?

Poverty Rate for Children and Teenagers Higher Than Other Age Groups


In 2010, nearly **610,000** or **one out of four** in this age group was below the poverty line.

Year over Year Job Change in Georgia, January 2001 to April 2012




Unemployment peaked at 10.5% in 2009


Unemployment is now 8.9%, up from 5.1% in December 2007

Georgia's Median Household Income Falls to Early-'90s Levels




Spike in Number of Georgians Living in Poverty Since 2008



TANF Not Keeping Pace With Rise in Poverty in Georgia





State Unemployment Insurance in Georgia

Employers contribute to state fund from which state UI benefits are paid

Low Unemployment Insurance Taxes Ranks **48**th in the nation

Low Unemployment Insurance Benefits Ranks **49**th in the nation

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Unemployment Insurance Cuts

Employer tax cuts drained billions from state fund

Georgia owes Federal Government \$746.8 million

- **New Law:**
- Permanently reduces maximum weeks of UI benefits to lowest in the country
- Gives employers a permanent cut in their UI obligations



Georgia Faces Many New Health Challenges



Georgia has Limited Medical Providers Throughout the State



87% of counties have at least one Primary Care Health Professional Shortage Area

93% of counties have Medically Underserved Areas/Populations

16 counties have either no doctors' offices or no primary care providers

5 counties have neither doctors' offices nor primary care providers





Are Georgia's Most Vulnerable Populations Supported by Public Health Programs?


Public Programs Reduce Uninsured for Children and Elderly


Uninsured Rate (Georgia) by Age, 2009-2010








