



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## Georgia by the Numbers – Health Care

- 50<sup>th</sup> in Medicaid spending per patient
- 49<sup>th</sup> in statewide health care spending per capita
- 5<sup>th</sup> most uninsured residents
- 4<sup>th</sup> most uninsured kids



#### **Georgians Face Significant Coverage Gaps:**




**Expanding Medicaid eligibility could extend health coverage to 600,000 uninsured Georgians** 

#### Uninsured Adults Could Gain Health Coverage


- 100% Federally Funded Thru 2016

- No Deadline for States, No Long-Term Commitment

- 12,000 Jobs







# GSU Study Shows Benefits Throughout GA


- Up to 70,000 Jobs Statewide

#### **New Revenue Offsets Much of New State Costs**



State Premium Tax Revenue	\$751 Million
State Income & Sales Tax Revenue	\$1.0 Billion
10-year Net State Costs (after new revenue)	\$353 million
Average Yearly Costs as Percent of 2014 Budget	0.2 percent



# Half of All States Set to Expand Medicaid



- More than 4-in-10 uninsured adults in U.S. live in 12 southern states
- 3.7 million fall into
   Coverage Gap in 10
   non-expanding
   southern states
- 400,000+ in Georgia



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
